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
Learning for Life, Anchored in Christ

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Safeguarding...



Online gaming means you can play in real time with people across the world through a computer, games console, tablet or smartphone connected to the internet. Games can offer children a world of adventure to immerse themselves in, but it's important to understand how children can stay safe and what games are appropriate for their age.

Gaming is a fun and sociable way to spend time, encouraging teamwork and developing skills. All good stuff, but there are a few things you need to be aware of:

- 1. Get involved by finding out what type of games your child enjoys and making sure they're appropriate for their age.
- 2. Some games let children play and chat with anyone in the world. This means they might come across offensive language and bullying.
- 3. Not everyone online is who they say they are. Children should avoid giving out personal details that could identify them or their location - including photos wearing school uniform or address information in the background.
- 4. Some games encourage players to buy extra elements during the game – children have been known to run up large bills without realising.


The PEGI (Pan European Gaming Information) labels appear on a game's packaging indicating one of the following age levels: 3, 7, 12, 16 and 18. They provide a reliable indication of the suitability of the game content for different ages. Descriptors will indicate the main reasons why a game has received a particular age rating. There are eight such descriptors: bad language, discrimination, drugs, fear, gambling, sex, violence and online game play, with other people.
