Safeguarding

Being on time for school is extremely important not only for a child's education, but also for their mental well being. St. Clements Academy opens for pupils at 8.45am and lessons start promptly at 8.55am.

5 minutes late a day = 3 days of learning missed a year.

10 minutes late a day = 6 days of learning missed a year.

15 minutes late a day = 10 days of learning missed a year.

There are several ways to ensure you are ready for school on time.

- 1. Keep a good night-time/bed routine.
- 2. Uniform and school equipment ready the night before.
- 3. Talk to school staff for more information or support.

As well as ensuring your child arrives to school on time, it is also important to collect them at the end of the day at 3.15pm (unless they are attending after school clubs). Late collection is very upsetting for children and can lead to parents receiving a letter from the Head Teacher or require you attending a meeting if late collection is continuous.

Please speak with school staff if you need more information regarding academy times or support in matters regarding punctuality.

St Clement's have been committed to working towards the award since 2016 and when we achieved what was then the Bronze level. We are now well on our way towards achieving the silver award.
